Artist Dorothy Williams Stuart

(Thanks to Jack Fowler for suggesting that I interview Dorothy and for getting me her contact information.)

If you attended the Centennial or received a copy of the Centennial yearbook from 1989, then you will recognize this pen and ink drawing by Fresno artist Dorothy Williams Stuart. This drawing of Royce Hall was done in 1976 and is part of 12 pen and ink drawings that Dorothy has done of various valley scenes over the years. The drawings were of buildings that she remembered as a child. But pen and ink are only a part of her many pieces of art that she has done over a period of 35 years.

Dorothy graduated from Fresno High in 1951 and remembers that her class was the first class that entered as 9th graders. She took art classes because she enjoyed doing art but didn't think it was something that she wanted to go into as a career. Growing up she wasn't involved in many activities at school because she had to go home to help her mother. But she remembers that she participated in Tee Pee Talent as a 9th grader, being part of a group dance that she and others learned in PE.

Dorothy was born in Fresno in a house on Clay Street in 1933 during the Depression. Her father brought in a doctor when she was born, and her grandmother was the midwife who helped the doctor deliver her. As a child, she remembers playing in the sprinklers during the hot summers because there was no air conditioning. During high school, she and her friends would go down to Fulton St. in front of the Wilson Theatre and wave and yell at each other. They also liked to drag the main street. Her advice to kids about high school is, "You better enjoy it. You'll never go through that phase of life again. You feel a joy in friends."

Dorothy met her husband Ross Stuart on a blind date. A friend had asked her to go out with her and another girl. She didn't know then that her future husband would be one of the guys that they picked up. Because her future husband was already a graduate (from Clovis High), he didn't qualify to take Dorothy to her Fresno High Prom. But being resourceful, one of Dorothy's friends gave her the name of a Roosevelt boy who was not going to attend the Prom. Dorothy just had to introduce her date to the faculty receiving line, using the name of the Roosevelt boy. Sixty-two years later, Ross and Dorothy are still married.

Dorothy's early art interest began when one of her kindergarten drawings ended up being shown at the Fresno Fair. Unfortunately, this early drawing was never returned to her. Despite having taken some art classes at Fresno High, Dorothy only started taking art classes at Fresno City College

later on in life after her husband encouraged her to get into art because he knew that she liked it so much. So after enrolling in a painting class at night school in 1964, her art career was born. She had 3 young daughters at the time, and so Dorothy would paint at night after they went to bed. As she progressed in her art, Dorothy joined the Society of Western Artists. Once a month, the Society of Western Artists would do demonstrations. They also held weekend workshops where an artist would come to demonstrate their style of art. She met a lot of local artists, including Rollin Pickford, who asked the group to take limestone and draw on them like a lithograph, and then put a solution on them. The drawing would etch into the limestone and then they would put ink on it and paper after that. The ink would transfer to the paper. She later did an entire art show in 1974 using this technique.

Over the course of 35 years, Dorothy developed as an artist. She and her husband have traveled to over 100 countries, and wherever she has traveled, she tried to capture what she saw in her art.

When she did her 12 pen and ink drawings in the '70s and '80s, including that of Royce Hall, she tried to pick buildings that she remembered growing up. She did the Sun Maid building because they lived out in Sunnyside at the time, and she would see it all of the time. She did the Boy and the Leaking Boot (a sculpture in Courthouse Park) because she liked the sculpture. It was her first of the 12 that she did.

Dorothy became involved with the Fresno High Centennial Celebration after she was invited to be on the board. This is when she first met Jack Fowler. It was Jack who asked her to help with the yearbook for the Centennial. Dorothy eventually became the Centennial Yearbook Co-Chair, Art Director, and Editor. She and other alumni would meet every week at Fresno High to collect items that would eventually become part of that yearbook. Each class was allowed 2 pages. In the back of the book, they did ads to bring in money. She recalls that it took a good year to produce that yearbook. The Centennial Committee even produced a t-shirt with one of Dorothy's drawings on it.

Visiting her home, Dorothy points out all of the artwork that adorns the walls. Artwork that has done in different styles, and some artwork that she and her husband have collected during their travels. In her home office, she has a map of the world with pins marking every country that she and her husband have visited. Wanting to visit as many countries as possible over the years, her husband would pick their next adventure. She spoke about their trip to Africa and how much she enjoyed it because it was "not fenced in". Her paintings were a by-product of their travels, taking only about 15-20 minutes to sketch or paint a scene.

Dorothy's other passion is her community work for the Women's Conference. This is her 28th year and has been involved since the very beginning. She also served as the Vice President of the Western Artists of Fresno from 1967 to 1990. She is most proud of her two certificates from Who's Who Among American Women.

Asked what advice she would give to current Fresno High students, she said, "Follow your dreams." That is exactly what Dorothy Williams Stuart did with her life.

A Night with Peggy Lee

When I was 17 and a junior at Fresno High (1949), several male friends and I decided to see Peggy Lee who was going to perform at the State Theater on Fresno Street between Fulton and Van Ness. We got there early and found seats near the front and settled in for one of the more memorable nights we had had up to that point. Dave Barbour, her husband, guitarist and composer, and a small group accompanied her. Both Lee and Barbour were in Bennie Goodman's band, but when they married, Barbour was fired and Lee left with him. At the Fresno performance, Ms. Lee was then about 29 and in the beginning of her great musical years. She came on stage in a white sequined dress down to the floor and we all sighed; she was a knockout. Her sizzling delivery was the style that got the audiences to quiet down. What an evening to remember.

My favorite song of all time was her "Is That All There Is" because it had such a sultry delivery. She recorded the song in 1969 when she was 50 years old. The words are a little sad but it ends well. Maybe the delivery came from her life experiences as she had gone through a lot at that point. She had two more husbands after the Fresno performance and a lot of success as a singer. She composed and wrote lyrics for the biggest names in show business as well as performing.

My First Experience at Fresno High

The game I remember the most was the "**Big - Little Game**" with that dreaded rival, Roosevelt. It was played at **Ratcliffe Stadium** before 10,000 spectators and was written about in **Life Magazine**. An exciting lightweight game was played prior to the varsity game.

"Our strong band can neer be
broken, formed at Fresno High."
We were Warriors. We wore
purple and gold. Our graduates
became doctors, lawyers, judges,
movie actors, education, sports

figures and backbones of the
Fresno business community.
They also defended our country
and made the supreme sacrifice in
World War II as part of the
'Greatest Generation'.

The Red Wave and Bulldogs were
not the biggest game in Fresno. It
was the "**Little Big Game**"
between Fresno High School and
Roosevelt High School that filled
Ratcliffe Stadium to capacity
every year. We cheered our
teams that produced **Big Jim**
Jurkovich, **Malcolm DeOrian**,
Gene Lamoure, **Adolph Pierini**,
Pat Militano, **George Zenovich**,
Ray Patterson, the **Saghatelian**
brothers and many others on to
victory as they fought for
possession of the little pig statue.
(The game was later named the
Pig Bowl). All under the coaching
of **Coach Erwin Ginsburg**. **May**
McCardle taught us and has a
room named for her in the Fresno
County Library. **Ida C. Moody**
taught my mother Latin in Hanford
High School in 1908 and taught
me history at Fresno High School
in 1940. I walked home down Van
Ness Boulevard after school with
Jan Ohanion, **Marian Franklin**,
Leo Biehl, **Doris Mezzano** and
others. **Jay Ohanion** changed his
name to **Mike Connors** and
starred in the long running TV
show '**Mannix**'. His older sister
Arpie was an accomplished
pianist.

We also claimed **Alex Papulias**,
founder of Pappy's Meats and
seasonings. In our class was the
lovely **Dorothy Ohanessian** who
went on to star at the New York
Metropolitan Opera. She married
Clement Renzi, a world-
renowned sculptor who sculpted
many of the pieces on the Fulton
Mall. We also claimed **Terry Eby**
who became a dress designer in
Hollywood, and **June Dake** who
designed our yearbook and
became a well-known commercial
artist. **Leland Scott** became a
Fresno City Councilman; **Kirk**
Gibbs became a judge; **Stanley**
Steinberg became well known in
Sacramento political circles;

George Zenovich became a California State Assemblyman.

Corky Normart was commissioned in 1994 to design and install the Rose Window in the Great Dome of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem where Jesus is buried. He completed it in 1997 after many trips abroad. He also designed several fantastic posters of Fresno as he remembered it.

Our many Chinese students became doctors, dentists, architects and accountants to name a few. Sadly, many of our Japanese classmates were interred in relocation camps, but many of them fought in World War II and became heroes to us all. They came back after the war and became successful business and professional people as well as successful farmers.

We had sock hops at noon in the gym and what fun it was to watch the jitterbuggers! They danced to Glenn Miller, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey, Bob Crosby and many others. We listened to the voices of Bing Crosby, Perry Como, Frank Sinatra, Vic Damone, and Tony Bennett. Patty Paige was a favorite as were Doris Day, Margaret Whiting, Rosemary Clooney, and others.

We also gathered at **Stillman's Drug Store and Fountain** at the corner of Weldon and Van Ness for ice cream and sodas. Across Echo Avenue from Fresno High was **Albert's**, another fountain...both were full to capacity at lunchtime.

Then all four of our children went to Fresno High from 1958 to 1967. This brought us a whole new group of movers and shakers of the Fresno community. **Dewey Slater** of Slater Furniture, **Robert Boro** world renowned landscape architect, **Tom Seaver** the great baseball hall of famer; **Steve Wakefield** of Wakefield and Hopper real estate. **Gene Gomes**, Judge of the Fifth District Court of Appeals; **James Ardaiz**, Chief Justice of the Court of

Appeals; **Charles Amirkhanian**, composer and pianist; **Kopi Sotiropulos**, our local newsman; **John Marinovich**, school administrator; **Pat Corrales** as both a baseball player and coach. **Cher** (of Sonny and Cher) went to Fresno High in about 1962...of course then she was **Cherilyn Sarkisian**.

Fresno High also boasts the longest active high school club in the United States in their '**Senate**'. It is now 125 years old. Fresno High also has a very active **Alumni Association**. They are involved in raising money for school projects such as their **Wall of Champions** and scholarships. They host an annual banquet on the street in front of Fresno High and it is a lot of fun and well attended.

On a personal note, our oldest son **Mike**, was a founder of the **Torquers Auto Club** at Fresno High. He played some baseball and football while there. He now lives in Utah, has a trucking business, had four children and his thirteenth grandchild on the way...he also has 1 great grandchild. Our son **Roger** worked for PG&E for 27 years and now has his own mortgage company and has built many homes in Oakhurst...he was also named businessman of the year by the Chamber of Commerce. He has 2 children and 2 grandchildren.

Our daughter **Sue** and her husband **Randy** own Oakhurst Giftworks and Oakhurst Frameworks. They have also been named business people of the year by the Oakhurst Chamber of Commerce. They have 2 children. **Tim** was a member of the Senate and also a student body officer, lettered in several sports, and operates his own trucking business. He and his wife have 2 children and 6 grandchildren.

I treasure my years at Fresno High School. I went there from February of 1936 to June of 1940. Hamilton Junior High was in the

basement of Fresno High when I went there. I am truly delighted with the restoration work they have done to make her look like the Grand Old Dame that she is. So '**Hail to Thee, Our Alma Mater, Hail To Fresno High!**'

Since she had always been placed in honors and GATE classes, seeing her classmates struggle caused her to become concerned for them. It was during her 9th grade year that she realized that she wanted to become an English teacher. Her belief is that knowing how to present yourself in an articulate way, whether through speaking or writing, is necessary to any future success. Four years later, she still holds to her goal of becoming an English teacher, ultimately wanting to come back and teach English at Fresno High.

Angela is a **full diploma candidate** in the **International Baccalaureate Program** which is the most academically rigorous program in the world – one that is accepted at colleges and

universities all over the world. Part of the IB goal is for all of its students to be well-rounded which is an understatement when applied to Angela. She was the Associated Student Body President her senior year, a three-sport athlete in soccer, lacrosse, and cross country, and was selected to be the only student representative to the Fresno Unified School District Board of Trustees. As the student representative, she attended all of the Board meetings as well as having a vote on all Board actions. Angela also served as the Senate President and Film Club President.

Angela was also a member of the Human Element for Fresno Unified. Several years ago Fresno Unified's Student Advisory Board set about on a task of using video to show why we are all one and deserving of being treated with dignity and respect. The Human Element video, which the students produced, features the stories of three students (Angela is one of them) who opened themselves up to share on film their personal struggles. Desiree Harding remembers watching Kobe Bryant on TV, influencing her to try out for basketball at Wawona Middle School. As part of her 7th grade team, they made it the playoffs but

were knocked out in the first round. As an 8th grader, her team made it to the championship game, but lost to Tenaya by 8 points. But being a student at Wawona, she was also a part of the **International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program**. To continue in the IB program meant going to Fresno High. Of course, there were those who thought that she should go to a different high school, one with a winning girls' basketball program, but Desiree wanted to be part of starting something – to establish a new winning tradition at Fresno High School.



And so she enrolled in the prestigious IB program, becoming a full diploma candidate while taking 6 college-level exams, doing an extended essay, and participating in Creativity Action Service which has students involved with creative thinking, physical activity for a healthy lifestyle, and volunteering in the community.

Throughout her 4-year career at Fresno High, the team won 74 games (only winning 24 games in 4 seasons before she enrolled), winning the league title this year and making it to the Division III title game only to lose to Mission Oak. She also ran cross country, finishing in 3rd place in the NYL and 26th overall in the valley.

When asked about how she felt about attending Fresno High, she told me that she loved the whole atmosphere of the school. "Everyone was friendly, very kind and caring. Teachers make you feel at home, and they support you." This fall Desiree will be attending Eastern Washington University on a 4-year basketball scholarship. Her major is

biomedical engineering which allows researchers to construct the chemical formula for new drugs.


