Wow, we are now 125 years old. What a legacy that Fresno High continues to write. And what has the Alumni Association done? A lot more than just putting on the all-school dinners and Wall of Champions dinner. Because of the generosity of the alumni, we have given over \$100,000 back to the school through scholarships, athletic, JROTC, music, and academic grants, to the Top Twenty Dinner plus sponsoring 40 students so that they can attend the Wall of Champions dinner.

In the beginning, our association helped to plant trees, pushed for new asphalt courts north of the gym, led the push to replace the old wooden gym bleachers, to paying for medallions and paint to help restore Royce Hall after the fire.

We have honored so many alumni since our humble start like Brigadier General Fred C. Weyand ('34) at the Alumni Dinner. We even had a helicopter flyover during dinner that left many a little teary eyed. We honored Grover Groves ('39), someone who never ran out of stories. There was Joe Levy ('50) who gave so much back to the school. In 2005 we honored Federal Judge Robert Coyle. One year we honored all of the then past and present living principals

– Art Miller, Jack Mulkey, and Ray Baker (all 3 now deceased), and former principals Jeanne Contel, John Marinovich, and Bob Reyes. And in 2003 we honored Leslie Sirman ('23), who was remembered for riding his bicycle from 1st Street and Tulare to get to school every day. We also honored baseball's best high school team, the 1958 squad led by Coach Ollie Bidwell. We've honored major league players Dick Ellsworth, Jim Maloney, Pat Corrales and many others.

We have attended class reunions for the classes of 1936, 1937, 1939, 1941, and 1943 and numerous other reunions. Because of the Alumni Association, friendships have been renewed, and we have met so many wonderful new alumni.

The Alumni Association has been involved with financial support for the Fresno High International Baccalaureate Program.

Fresno High has such a great legacy and we need to keep it alive. I ask you, if your class is not represented, please help by attending our monthly meetings – the 2nd Wednesday of each month at 5:30 p.m. in the administration building.

All of this would not have happened if not for the support of former principal Bob Reyes who envisioned what a great support an alumni association would give to the school. He assigned then Assistant Principal Kim Mecum and Counselor PJ Machado to work with the alumni association in putting on the first alumni dinner 15 years ago.

Principal's Message

Spring is a great time of year and every inch of campus is filled with active students engaged in athletics, academics, and performances. Today I participated in a whiffle ball homerun derby on goat hill. The contest pitted staff verses students. We had a huge crowd of students on hand to laugh and enjoy this annual event. Days like today remind me of the privilege it is to be a part of the Warrior Family.

Our musical opened this month with support of 4 new wireless headset microphones purchased with a grant from the Alumni Association. The impact of this gift was immediately apparent. These 4 microphones added to the 4 we already used means that our audiences can clearly hear all the spoken and sung words from our talented students. We cannot say thank you enough for the investment the alumni make in our school.

I have heard stories from alumni reminiscing about the Fresno High campus before the bunkers were built. They described how students would play pick-up games of football, sit and talk with friends, or read a book. It was a year ago that we opened and

dedicated Warrior Park (the name given to the green space in front of Royce Hall). Now when you drive by Fresno High in the afternoon, you once again see students enjoying our campus. Students sit in the shade of trees reading, others toss a football. Our color guard practices their routines and the drum line rehearses their award winning shows. We are proud of our beautiful school.

Academically, Fresno High recently posted the second highest growth (second only to Edison HS) on the Degrees of Reading Power (DRP) exams. These scores are a result of our teachers challenging students with complex text and providing opportunities for students to process and think critically. With our IB MYP Authorization secured in November 2014, all students in grades 9 & 10 are part of the academically and internationally focused IB curriculum. We are already seeing the impact of how this program is helping prepare our students for more college and career options upon graduation. Our next big project will be to create authorized IB Career Programs in Engineering and Marketing & Business.

Our Winter sports season ended with success in both men's and women's teams. Our girls basketball team won their first outright NYL title in 34 years and came up 3 points short of winning the school's first Valley Championship. Star Dez Harding became the second All-Time leading scorer in the Central Section with 1500 points. The boys basketball team was co-league champions and made it to the quarter finals for the valley champion. Both varsity basketball coaches (Dan Avila and Carvel Wafer) won back-to-back coach of the year honors. We were very proud of all our athletes and how they represented Fresno High this season!

Fresno High has recently experienced a resurgence in the

performing arts. Last year I reported that our concert band received praise from the competition judges. This year the concert band received its first "Superior" rating (the highest possible) in over two decades. We had five students earn places in the 3rd Fresno Unified district honor band (the most ever). We are very proud of our student musicians!

From academics to athletics and everything in between, Fresno High continues to show our city it is ready to shine. It's an honor to serve as your principal of THE Fresno High School.

Kopi, A Newsmen for All Seasons

Ask Kopi Sotiropulos what he remembers about Fresno High, and he'll give you a litany of his favorite memories. "I had fun at Fresno High. I had a lot of good friends. It was a wonderful environment. And it was a school with so much history. I was in plays in Royce Hall. I even have two auditorium chairs that my wife bought for me at one of the May Alumni Dinners. While I was the auctioneer, my wife kept bidding and finally bought them for \$1000. One of those chairs has '26' on it (a fitting reference to the channel that he has worked at for all these years). I performed in school plays, *My Fair Lady* and *Arms and the Man*. I was a dancer and actor, but I couldn't sing. Mr. Macy was my drama teacher. I remember his class was on the 2nd floor of Royce Hall. You could look out of his room and see the Sierra Nevadas and the snow. The air was much cleaner back then."

Kopi Sotiropulos' family moved from Greece to Fresno when he was 3 and ½ years old. He couldn't speak any English and entered Fremont Elementary. Speaking no English in kindergarten, Kopi managed to learn the language in 6 months. Back then, he recalled, you had no choice. It was sink or swim – and so he learned English. He remembers downtown Fresno before the mall. Great neighborhoods. Going to the zoo. He'd swim at Fresno High during the summer. Played baseball at Fresno High and at Hamilton. The Fresno High area was a great place to grow up according to Kopi. Fresno High looked like a New England university. He remembers the Dipper Dan ice cream shop across the street and McDonalds at Blackstone and Shields. All of these experiences and memories becoming the comfortable fabric of the Fresno of his youth.

Besides being in plays and acting while in high school, Kopi was also a varsity yell leader during his senior year. He was also manager of the baseball team one year.

One of his other high school activities was being a member of the House of Lords. No longer in existence on the campus, the House of Lords was similar to the Senate in that their members gave speeches and had to dress professionally to their meetings. Kopi still has his House of Lords sweatshirt.

Fresno High definitely made an impression on Kopi, one that has carried him forwards to a career in broadcasting. It was at Fresno High that Kopi learned how to easily make friends. It was a happy place and one that he looked forward to going to every day. It was not only where you went during the school week but where you even went on weekends. To him, it was the center of activity and like a second home. A "warm and friendly" place.

After graduating from high school, Kopi attended Fresno City College, taking general ed classes, theater, and speech. He then spent a semester at LA City College where he discovered broadcasting. That was when he made his decision to pursue his career. From there he enrolled at San Francisco State to major in Broadcast Communications Arts. He also took some film classes and graduated in 1971. He returned to Fresno and started sending out his resume. In October of 1971, Kopi started to work for Channel 26. There were only 3 of them in the production department. They did all of the commercials, promotional announcements. They wrote it all. They were an independent station with no network affiliation. The station had no news program at the time. It was mostly religious programming because they paid cash.

Kopi married Elaine in 1975 and in 1977, they both decided to quit their jobs in Fresno and move to Hollywood in order for Kopi to pursue an acting career. He wanted to become an actor and experience a show biz life in Hollywood. He was in a TV movie, *The Amazing Howard Hughes*, starring Tommy Lee Jones. He started as an extra in one of the scenes, but because he made a suggestion about using a line in the scene, the director had him join the Screen Actors Guild in order for Kopi to be able to have a speaking part. When he went to sign up for the Screen Actors Guild in Studio City, he had to go up an elevator to the office. Standing in that elevator was Paul Newman. Kopi briefly thought about saying something to the famous actor but decided to not make a fool of himself and kept quiet. Hard to believe that this young Kopi could not think of something to say. Kopi remembers that moment like it was yesterday. During his 10 years in Hollywood, Kopi was in *Threes Company*, the *Incredible Hulk*, the *6 Million Dollar Man*, the

Mary Tyler Moore Show, *David Letterman* (his musical variety show), the *Postman Always Rings Twice* with Jack Nicholson, *Highway to Heaven*, *Mike Hammer*, *Night Rider*, *Soap* (the sitcom), *Nowhere to Run* with David Janzen, *Hardy Boys Mysteries*, and *American Gigolo*. Most of his appearances were one line or guest starring parts. His biggest role was the *Incredible Hulk* with Bill Bixby.

After 10 years of working in Hollywood, Kopi and Elaine decided to move back to Fresno. Kopi found work hanging drapes and doing telemarketing. During this time period, Kopi and Elaine were blessed with the birth of their two kids, Anastasia and Vasilii. In 1987, Kopi started freelancing as a writer and producer of commercials. Angelo Stalis was working at Channel 30 as their weather person, and Kopi was asked if he wanted to apply to be their weekend weather guy. Kopi auditioned but before he was hired, Channel 26 offered him the weather job for the 10 o'clock news program. This was in 1990 and then in 2003, he became the co-host for Great Day. He did both shows for 3 years but eventually settled on doing just Great Day.

One of Kopi's trademarks, if you ever see him in person, is his red tennis shoes (pictured below you can see his tennis shoes have his name and Great Day custom printed on the back of each shoe). The history behind his trademark shoes began when he was looking for a new pair of



tennis shoes. He ended up at Copelands and his eye caught some red tennis shoes for \$9.99. Not a bad color or price according to Kopi. He would wear the red tennis shoes to schools that he would visit, and then one day he

didn't have his good shoes and wore his red tennis shoes on air. No one at the station said anything, and so he has been wearing them ever since then.

What drives Kopi to continue his strong support of Fresno High is that it was his foundation and was what molded him into who he is today. It is this fondness for Fresno High that drives him to continue to give back to his alma mater. To current Fresno High students he would say, "Get your education because without it, it will be tough. Follow your dreams. If you want it, go for it. You don't want to regret it later. No matter what the outcome, at least you gave it a shot." Indeed wise advice for a man who gives no indication of slowing down.

Sydnie Vinuela (Class of 2012): Junior year at CSU Fresno, Smittcamp Family Honors College. Studying Humanities:

"Dear Fresno High School Alumni, This is my third year at Fresno State in the Smittcamp Family Honors College. My major is Humanities & Classics, a type of hybrid self-designed major that I petitioned to be created on campus just for me. The workload is that of a double major, but held under one title. In addition to that major I have recently added a minor in Linguistics. I decided that I could no longer ignore my love for language. By the time I graduate I will have knowledge of four languages: Latin, Greek, German, and Sanskrit. These three fields: humanities, classics, and linguistics are the core of my studies. At the beginning of this year I struggled to see how I could bring the three together to conduct my Honors Research and then subsequently write my thesis. I met with professors around campus and through many different discussions I arrived at an idea and have now begun my research. As a graduate of Fresno High I entered Fresno State with already 4 years of a Latin education, and I've now continued it at Fresno State. With 7 years of Latin under my belt, I decided that my project would benefit best if it focused on the Latin language. From there I decided to research a specific poetic meter of Latin. The majority of Latin meter is stolen from the Greeks, but there is one body of work called the Saturnian poetry that is native. Just 3 years ago a new doctoral thesis was released on the subject, and his discovery comes so close that I have proposed minor changes in which a better outcome is produced. Currently I am testing my own hypothesis against his and applying to research fellowships for support.

By the end of this year I will have a final project that I will present at the UCLA Indo-European Linguistics Conference and it will be publishable. This research is the largest part of my work this year and I hope to arrive at a useful discovery.

In addition to academic work, I also have two jobs in Fresno. I work with a local pizza truck and catering company called, "Mattie's Wood Fired Pizza & Catering" and I am an assistant in a financial planner's office. I do not work many hours between the two jobs and they are both very flexible with my busy schedule; I am extremely lucky to have great bosses. These jobs not only give me a bit of extra money, but they help make my desire to study abroad a reality! Just two years ago I traveled to London, England for 3 weeks to do a summer Humanities course. This summer I will be spending 4 weeks in Greece with a Fresno State program and just two days ago I was accepted into the Paideia Institute's "Living Latin in Rome" 5-week intensive language program. So I am excited to share that I will be living in Europe for over 2 months this summer and I could not be more thrilled!!

As for the future, I am looking into doctoral programs in Indo-European Linguistics, Classics, and special interdisciplinary ones that combine all of my studies. I would like to earn my PhD abroad in Germany or England or attend a school on the east coast. I love my family and I love California, but I would like to get the chance to move away for my graduate studies. After earning my PhD I'd like to become a professor that continues to conduct research, publish, and travel every summer with students!

Devinne Vaughn (Class of 2011): My first year in college was a rough one. I was unsure and confused

about how the whole place worked because of how spread out my classes and resources were and still are. I was just taking classes to fulfill general education requirements although they say it's something you should save for last so that you have easier classes to take after you're done with your major. By my second year I had managed to jump between five different science departments and failed a basic math class before I was thoroughly frustrated with myself and the lack of help I was getting from my academic advisers. It wasn't until I went to the career center and discovered Anthropology that I found what I was searching for. The classes I have taken have been more engaging and well suited for my learning skills and have helped me to narrow down on my end goal in life which is to own or run a rehabilitation facility for abused or exotic animals who have not led a life they should have.

Through all of my struggles of trying to find my path at UC Santa Cruz, I managed to keep myself at UCSC through a place called Cultural Arts and Diversity, also known as CAD which is run by our director and a mentor of mine, Don Williams. This is a center for students of color to find like-minded people to build relationships through the art of theater. CAD houses two large theater troupes called Rainbow Theater and the African American Theater Arts Troupe or AATAT. I started out in Rainbow as a dancer utilizing my skills to help start a new facet of Rainbow which also incorporates poetry and spans across many cultures to perform one act plays as well as creating an outreach show to bring to high schools to encourage them to move onto higher education. Since starting as a dancer my second year, I have been vice president of the student-run troupe as well as head stage manager for 2 shows and an academic facilitator. After Rainbow in the fall quarter came AATAT in the winter quarter where I explored my skills of make-up, hair and costume design for two years before becoming their academic facilitator to help the students balance out having a crazy schedule and long rehearsal nights. During the days I didn't spend with

the two theater troupes, I managed to volunteer at the Santa Cruz County Animal Shelter (SCCAS) as a form of therapy for myself and the animals there too. I also have furthered my training in Tahitian dancing and have gone so far as starting my own group on campus called People of the Islands or POI and in partnership with another dance studio called Siva Polynesia, I have managed to gain many more dance opportunities from dancing for the opening of a restaurant in San Francisco to dancing at the opening of a Giant's game.

Among all of these amazing experiences, I have also been blessed to have received an internship for the Chancellor of UCSC known as the Chancellor's Undergraduate Internship Program or CUIP. In my internship I work with a student-initiated outreach and retention, with a focus on retention, running a program called Umoja to assess the needs of the afro/black identified student population and to implement events and programming to help support those students through the community events put on by Umoja and other afro/black centered student organizations on campus. Umoja, meaning unity in swahili, was started because there was a need coming from the afro/black students asking for a way to keep themselves in a school dominated by non-students of color, in order to graduate. My job includes assessing the community to see what it is they need in order to build a unified community with them. Be it socially, culturally or academically, I helped to facilitate these events and programs. Through this work I have been able to not only help my students but myself at the same time.
