Principal's Message

THE Fresno High School: Tradition. Honor. Excellence.

Fresno High said goodbye to the 2012-13 school year by packing up 20 portable classrooms, the library, and the main office. A few short weeks later these buildings were demolished, but not before alumni, students, parents, and staff had a chance to take some swings at the administration building. We had great news coverage as the whole community celebrated *Bringing Down the Bunkers*. The end of the bunker era (1973-2013) marks the beginning of a new era with our two modern two-story buildings.

August 1st we began moving into our buildings. The north building houses the library, counseling offices, the Harris Reading Room, a new computer lab, and 10 upstairs classrooms. The main administrative office, attendance, nurse, parent center, senate chambers, and 10 upstairs classrooms are all housed in the south building. All buildings were open the first day of school. We opened with great excitement.

Of all the unpacking we did, we made certain to carefully

unpack the famous pig from the Little Big Game win in 2012. Our rivalry with the Roosevelt Roughriders continues this year on November 8th at the McLane football stadium. Join us as we earn the right to keep the pig for another year.

Fresno High continues to build a reputation of excellence academics, athletics and the arts. The International Baccalaureate Programme is doubling enrollment this next year. Top students from the class of 2013 are attending UCLA, UC-Berkley, UC-Davis, Mills College, and UC Merced. Ninety percent of the senior class applied for college, a high point for the last decade. In addition, thirty percent of our senior class was eligible to enter a UC or CSU.

Connecting with alumni to current students makes our school stronger. We love to hear from alumni about their stories of success. Each story we hear is communicated to our student body through announcements, Facebook, and Twitter accounts. Interview with Hilda Janssen Johnson (Class of 1936)

When World War II broke out, Hilda Janssen was working in downtown Fresno at Montgomery Wards. She decided to join the Womens Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC) and was sent to Des Moines for basic training. After that she was given a choice of either going to Albany, New York or to Florida. Hilda chose to go to the New York assignment for 30 days and became part of the WAAC recruiting department. She and other WAACS were sent to modeling school where they were shown how to walk and sit on stage (for Bond Rallies). They were assigned to go somewhere every day and every other night. When the WAAC decided to adopt a new uniform, she and the other WAAC in her department were instructed to wear the new uniform for 5 days out in the public to see what people's opinions were on it. The new uniform was an off-white, material, with short sleeves and a hat to match. Hilda was one of only six women chosen to model the new uniform. But when the WAAC became the WAC (Women's Army Corps), the Army accepted their uniform but had them switch to khaki to match the Army. According to Hilda, they were never allowed to wear slacks, but only skirts because they were ladies. But when she hitchhiked on military C47s and a B-25 going cross country, the pilots allowed her to switch to slacks for the flight. After 3 years in the Army, the war ended and Hilda got out.

Prior to entering Fresno High, Hilda attended Washington Junior High for 7th and 8th grades. She first attended Fresno High in 1933 when she was a 9th grader at Hamilton. Back then, the new Hamilton School was being built at Clinton and Palm and so the

Hamilton 9th graders occupied the bottom floors of Royce and Palmer Halls while the rest of the campus was occupied by Fresno High 10th through 12th grades. At age 94, Hilda fondly remembers how nice the teachers at Fresno High were, especially to a shy girl whose family lived on the west side of Highway 99. In fact, according to Hilda, everything west of Palm was just open fields and farmland. She grew up in the Depression and remembers not having a lot of material things, but living on a farm, they always had food to eat. But being tall and thin, one caring teacher took the time to talk to Hilda because she was concerned that Hilda was not getting enough to eat. Hilda found other caring teachers during her time at Fresno High. "We could sense those outstanding teachers who really cared about us. They related to us, and we related to them." She remembers her English teacher that she had in the afternoon. "There was no air conditioning then, and when our room would become too warm, she would teach the class outside under a tree because we had no air conditioning back then. We would sit on the grass by LeConte Hall. The teachers related to us and we related to them. We could sense those outstanding teachers who really cared about us."

Hilda remembers being good in math, but back then people told the girls that they did not need to take all of the math classes. She recalls taking the city wide test in Algebra and getting the highest score in the city. 9th grade. A football player, a hero of the school, asked her to lean to one side so that he could see her algebra test. She had to help him out because he was a football hero. She also remembers being one of only four girls in trigonometry. But eventually all of the girls including Hilda dropped out. She remembers people would ask the girls why they were taking the higher math class. Hilda wanted to stay so bad but all the other girls had dropped out by

then.

Hilda recalls being a member of Girls' Glee (choir) and performing in an Operetta (an evening dramatic program) while at Fresno High. She also belonged to Girl Reserves (sponsored by YWCA).

"We were poor in high school. When I was 16, I worked at the dime store just to be able to get clothes. Back in those days most all of the girls and boys activities were separated. The teachers were very good to me. I remember Mrs. Stubblefield, a teacher, called me in because she was concerned that I was too skinny. This was during the Depression. City kids struggled but we had 2 acres out on the west side of 99 so we always had enough to eat. West of Palm was open fields. I couldn't wait for the grapes to ripen. Most of the land was farmland west of Fresno High."

There were street cars in those days. No buses. Hilda remembers street cars but no buses when she was growing up. Her high school principal was Edwin Kratt was whom she called the "best principal". "The kids all liked him. He didn't put up with any nonsense from the kids. Everyone respected him."

During her time at Fresno High, she remembers the Albert's Drugstore at the corner. Hilda would buy a frozen Milky Way candy bar. She would then make a cream-filled sandwich (from her cows) which she sold to a "city girl" for 5 cents.

This past April the "Wish of a Lifetime" sponsored by Brookdale, which owns 620 assisted living homes, paid for a group of 6 veterans to fly back to Washington, D.C. to see the Women's Memorial and the WWII Memorial. While they were in Washington, the group was treated as the guests of honor at the Washington Nationals baseball game. They were given hoodie sweatshirts and baseball caps to wear and entered through the VIP entrance. They were also

treated to dinner at the President's Club and sat behind home plate. "At end of the 3rd inning, the PA announcer introduced us. Everyone stood up and applauded and thanked us. We looked on the big screen and there were our pictures on the screen. We were the honored guests at the game." Accompanied on the trip by her granddaughter, Hilda was so proud of the honor of being recognized for her service to her country.

After 94 years, Hilda conveys some of her philosophy about living life. "There's beauty in imperfection if you look or listen for it." Her motto: "Be patient. You could be in the same spot as the other person. I always try to see good in people". It is easy to see the good in Hilda Janssen Johnson.

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Jerry Tahajian

Jerry Tahajian, class of 1958, grew up in Corcoran and describes himself as a delinquent and someone prone to mischievous pranks. One holiday, he and some friends took sign barriers and put them across the main street in Corcoran and lit them on fire. He said that he also liked drag racing and drinking beer. He was also a kid whose mother had died when he was 12 years old.



It was when Jerry's father remarried that Jerry and his father came to Fresno to live with his new wife at Clinton and Palm by the old Hamilton Junior High. It was the spring semester of Jerry's junior year (1957) that he first enrolled at Fresno High. Jack Mulkey was his principal. When he registered for school, he was asked if he was a college prep student. Jerry replied no because he thought that they might put him in classes with all the "smart people." In his mind, he felt that in regular classes, he would stand a chance of getting good grades. But going to Fresno High also became a life-changing experience for Jerry. At Corcoran High School he was in a class of 125 students. The environment there was not conducive to inspiring young people to achieve. But during the year that Jerry spent at Fresno High, it opened up a different perspective on what he might be able to accomplish. Although he finished his last semester at Corcoran High School in order to graduate with his childhood friends, he'll tell you that his picture was in the '58 Fresno High yearbook and that he still

considers himself a Warrior.

When asked to describe his experience at Fresno High, Jerry tells it this way. "It was like going from an undeveloped country to a developed country." What stood out to him was the quality of the faculty and the students. "It was a college-going atmosphere at Fresno High. It was a difference in communities. The students were involved, were dynamic, looking forward to their futures. When you get in that environment, you get inspired. So one class in particular, I felt like I was having a one-on-one conversation with the teacher. I was interested in learning. It was the attention that I got from that teacher. It paid off. It really made a difference in my life. That's why I have such great feelings about Fresno High. It was the basis for my continuing interest in higher education. In the late 50's we had Maloney and Ellsworth. There was a lot of pride going on that added to the positive atmosphere. I remember the first assembly that I ever attended. I was amazed at all of the musical talent that was there. The singing groups, like the Choraleers, were like professional performers. Everyone was very friendly and very welcoming. All of this I appreciated very much."

After Jerry graduated from high school, he decided to go to Fresno State. Originally, he had not planned to go to Fresno State because of his poor grades. But someone had told him that Fresno State would accept you if you had 14 A's and B's on your transcripts, and that it didn't matter if the A's and B's were academic classes or not. So Jerry took his transcript to Fresno State, and they admitted him. He attributes his later success at Fresno State to the first class that he ever attended. It was with Dean Fisk of the business department who ended his first class presentation with: "Do the very best you can for one semester, and if you don't like the results, you can return to your mediocre self!" Jerry heard that and told himself that he didn't

want to be a mediocre student. He decided to work his tail off and ended up with a B average that first semester and that helped him to know that he could handle college.

According to Jerry, "Teachers can inspire students to become all that they can be as was the case with me or they can be mediocre themselves and not excite students about learning. To me education is the key to success in life. But you also have to have the right people do the teaching." Jerry went on to get his degree in Business Administration and became very active in student affairs. He was student body president in 62-63, and Pete Mehas was Athletic Commissioner. It was after that that Jerry decided that he wanted to get his law degree to go into corporate management. He went to the University of San Francisco for law school. It was in the fall of 1963 that he was sitting in law class when Kennedy was assassinated. Kennedy's death was so disturbing to him that he concluded that he was not ready for law school. It was then that he thought that he would take the real estate exam and took a job with a local real estate firm. While he was waiting to pass the exam, he went to Hughes Aircraft and was told to learn about accounting. He tried to become more knowledgeable about accounting. While working at this accounting firm, he eventually passed 3 out of 4 of the CPA exams. Meanwhile he had gotten married and decided to return to the University of San Francisco law school. Jerry eventually passed the last part of the CPA exam and then got his law degree in 1969. He taught accounting and law for a year at CSU Fresno and later taught part-time after he started practicing law.

William Forbes was his first employer. At that time, Morrie Scher was the estate and trust expert in Fresno and was considered the top lawyer in that

field. Morrie asked Jerry to join him. According to Jerry, in those days being a CPA and attorney was very rare. They were highly licensed people. Morrie taught Jerry what he needed to know about estate and trusts. Jerry opened his own law office in March of 1975 at the downtown Helm Building after one of the partners told Jerry that he would never become an equal partner in the firm. He was the sole practitioner at his law firm until 2011. He did wills, trusts and probate, estate and gift taxation.

Asking him what advice he would give current Fresno High students, Jerry says this. "I developed my love of learning while at Fresno High. The teachers just brought it out in me. From Dean Fisk, I learned that I could be successful

in college. Persistence, attitude, and belief will result in success. It's not how smart you are, but how dedicated you are to achieving your dreams." By all accounts, Jerry Tahajian is still a success.

Jack Mulkey

Jack Mulkey, former Fresno High School principal died May 28, 2013 in Edmond, OK at the age of 95. Mulkey served as principal in the late 1950's.

Prior to his educational career, Mulkey was an All-American football player at Fresno State University (Fresno State College at the time) from 1938 to 1940.

Mulkey came back to Fresno in November 2012 and was one of

four honorary captains for the Fresno State game against Air Force.
